Paul Tully has been selected by the AOH as the 2018 Grand Marshal because of his consistent and tireless work on behalf of the Irish Cultural Center Hudson Valley (ICCHV). Working with students at Ulster Community College to develop the original concepts for a building; chairing the event when the Irish Ambassador to the United States came here to support the ICCHV; submitting grant applications; planning for and attending countless developmental meetings throughout the years; and regularly supporting the many activities of the AOH and ICCHV

are just some of the reasons for which Paul has been chosen.

Paul lives in High Falls with his wife of 48 years, Lauren, who is a member of the LAOH. He is very proud of his three children and six grandchildren, and of his Irish Heritage. Both of his grandmothers were born in Ireland, coming over here as teenagers, one from Tipperary and one from Waterford. Each married a young man who had been born here, but whose parents were born in Ireland.

In 1889, immediately after arriving in the Port of New York, Paul's paternal grandmother, Mary Lynch, traveled to see her cousin in High Falls. Her cousin was a watchman for the D&H Canal Company and resided near Lock #14. Years later, after marrying and having six children, three of her children would find a home here in Ulster County.

The history on Paul's maternal grandmother's side is similar. His maternal grandmother would marry and have ten children, and have a house in Rosendale. Regarding those many aunts and uncles, Paul related one story about an uncle who was a Jesuit, and served as a Chaplain in WWII for the famous Fighting 69th. Father Steve Meany had been seriously wounded during the battle of Makin Island, in the South Pacific, and, in 1947, was chosen to be the Grand Marshal of the St. Patrick's Day parade in New York City.

In addition to serving on the Building Committee of the ICCHV, Paul also is very active in the community. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Friends of Historic Kingston (FOHK), and regularly conducts walking tours of both the Rondout and the Stockade

National Historic Districts on its behalf.

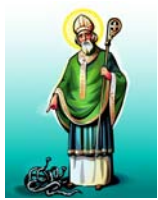

THE HISTORIAN'S CORNER

U2 – The Biggest Irish Rock Band Ever

By combining an original sound with honest lyrics and a challenging social message, U2 has earned the respect of critics, politicians, and fans around the world. U2 formed in Dublin in the fall of 1976. Meeting in Larry Mullen's home, U2 first played under the band name "Feedback". Original members included Adam Clayton on bass, Paul Hewson (Bono) on vocals, Dave Evans (The Edge) on guitar, and Mullen on drums. Feedback quickly changed their name to "The Hype". Forming a genuine friendship, the band's big break came in Limerick in March of 1978. At a talent show, CBS records Jackie Hayden judging, "The Hype" won the contest.

Changing their name to "U2", the band solicited Dublin business man Paul McGuinness to manage this aspiring rock sensation. In September of 1979, U2 released its first single, U2:3. In December of that year, U2 would travel to London for their first show outside

of Ireland. Finally, U2 signed its first contract with Island Records and in October of 1980 they released their first full album, Boy. The sound was unique and offered a fresh, new sound that earned rave reviews in both the Irish and UK press. Tackling subjects like faith, spirituality, and death, U2 becomes a politically active group. With the release of their second album in "October" in 1981 the embrace of Christianity can be seen in such songs as "With a Shout" and "Gloria".

U2 would enjoy international success with the release of their third album, War, in 1983. War featured the bands most aggressive songwriting to date in both music and lyrics. For the first time Bono addressed the long standing "troubles" in Northern Ireland. "Sunday bloody Sunday" clearly represented the struggle for freedom in Northern Ireland. Bono made it clear this was not a rebel song, but, one of peace as he wrapped himself in a white flag as he sang. Cracking the top 50 in the U.S. and with the help of MTV, U2 would become a household name. The success of War would gain the band financial rewards beyond their wildest dreams.

In 1984, the Unforgettable Fire would be released. Named for the survivors of the atomic bombs at Hiroshima and Nagasaki, gone was the aggression of the album War. The bands social and political messages stay alive in such songs as "Pride". Written to honor Dr. Martin Luther King Jr, Pride would honor his legacy. U2 was poised for international stardom in the mid 1980's. They earned it with a series of charitable live shows.

Live Aid for Ethiopian famine relief in July of 1985 was seen by more than a billion people worldwide.

Greatness arrives in 1987 with the release of the bands fifth album, "The Joshua Tree". Capitalizing on the success of The Joshua Tree, U2's "Rattle and Hum" would tie in Elvis, Bob Dylan, BB King, and the Beatles. Clearly, U2 had become an international sensation. Praised by critics worldwide, U2 had become the greatest Irish rock band ever.

Again, and again U2 would reinvent their sound. Releasing Actung Baby in 1991, Zooropa in 1993, and Pop in 1997. By the time the Pop tour ended in March 1998, U2 had taken its act to every inhabited continent on the planet. After the tour, U2 remained in the public eye by throwing its weight behind the Northern Ireland Peace Accord. They played a concert in Belfast in May of 1998, three days before the public voted in favor of the agreement. Later that year, U2 would perform for the victims of the Omagh, Northern Ireland bombing which killed 28 and injured hundreds more.

U2 would return to the studio early in 1999. Eventually releasing five more albums, "All that you can't leave behind" in 2000, "How to dismantle and atomic bomb" in 2004, "No line on the Horizon" in 2009, "Songs of Innocence" in 2014, and "Songs of experience" in 2017. With more than thirty years of experience, their last studio album is appropriately named. Still friends, the original band members remain committed to peace, Irish and American history,

and innovative song writing. U2 still has plenty of ambition for future greatness.

UPDATE ON GAELIC LANGUAGE CLASS AT KINGSTON CATHOLIC SCHOOL

There are two classes remaining in our Fall 2017 session and I am thrilled with the progress that our students are making. Naturally, the students are learning to read, write and speak Gaelic, and as previously reported, their efforts are optimized by the use of an Interactive computer white board and language software. All classwork is saved on the classroom computer and the constant reference and connection

between current and completed lessons is done instantly at the touch of a button! Video files on websites including YOUTUBE as well as games on online interactive websites make learning EASY AND FUN! We will have Native Speakers from Ireland as occasional instructors in language and song at our Friday night classes via SKYPE!!

Our students are speaking Gaelic with a beautiful Donegal accent and the folks of Northwestern Gaelic speaking Ireland will be duly impressed when our students cross their paths in the USA, Ireland or around the world. All of the five senses are used in acquiring the "new" language. Many of our students have Irish ancestry and are delighted to reclaim this wondrous part of their cultural inheritance and birthright which often times for sad reasons was tucked away and forgotten between the 19th century and today. The reasons folks are drawn to the class are varied and many and regardless, there is great joy amongst all in learning not just the language, but the mindset and perspectives of the culture and of course, the history of Ireland as well as Scotland - another Gaelic speaking nation whose northern and western people share the exact same Gaelic DNA as their Irish brothers and sisters across the small stretch of water that separates them.

Five absolutely new items that are outgrowths of our Gaelic language class are:

A once a month (Sunday at 2:30) traditional Irish music and singing session at Dermot Mahoney's Irish

Pub. Which Sunday of the month has yet to be determined. Songs will be in 3 languages: Irish Gaelic, Scottish Gaelic, and English. ANY and ALL musicians and singers are invited and WELCOME, keep checking the ICCHV website for details. Dermot Mahoney has graciously offered a 10% discount on all MEALS to those who participate. The Winter is LONG and COLD, come to Dermot's once a month, bring your family and friends and eat, drink, and BE MERRY!!

Tom was born in Manhattan, N.Y., on April 15, 1934, to the late John P. and Mary O'Brien Browne. He received his Bachelor of Arts in English from Catholic University, Washington, DC, and his Master of Arts in English from Manhattan College in Riverdale, N.Y. In 1953 Tom was admitted to the Christian Brothers, a Catholic religious order dedicated to teaching, and took the name Brother Bernard Francis, FSC. He accepted teaching assignments from 1957 to 1968. On Jan. 1, 1980 Tom was appointed City Treasurer of Kingston for 4 years under Mayor Donald Quick. After leaving office in 1984, Tom returned to teaching Special Education in the Rondout Valley School District. After 10 years Tom retired, but continued as a home tutor. Tom will be remembered by students, staff, faculty, and fellow workers as very supportive and patient. Tom was a true teacher who was known for his humor, friendliness and love for his chosen profession. He also was an avid skier and taught at Windham Mountain as a part time instructor for 10 years. While a member of the Trailsweepers Snow and Sports Club in Kingston he met his wife Muriel Wilde. They wed on May 22, 1982. During their 35 years of marriage they traveled to China, Australia, Italy, just to

name a few places. They also enjoyed square dancing, did volunteer work with the Crime Victims Assistance Program, and Tom was a proud member of the Ancient Order of Hibernian's in Kingston. 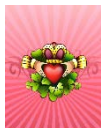
Ingredients

 3 tablespoons mild-flavor (light) molasses
 ¾ teaspoon ground cinnamon
 ¾ teaspoon ground ginger
 ½ teaspoon ground allspice
 ¼ teaspoon ground cloves
 Cream Cheese Frosting
 6 oz cream cheese, softened (from 8-oz package)
 1/3 cup butter, softened
 ¾ teaspoon vanilla
 2 ½ cups powdered sugar
 ¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon

Steps

- 1 Heat oven to 350°F. Spray bottom and sides of 13x9-inch pan with cooking spray.
- 2 In medium bowl, mix Gingerbread Bar ingredients until mixed well. Spread evenly in pan (mixture will be thick). Bake 20 to 23 minutes or until set and toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool completely, about 45 minutes.
- 3 In large bowl, beat cream cheese and 1/3 cup softened butter with electric mixer on medium speed 1 to 2 minutes, scraping bowl occasionally, until smooth and creamy. Beat in vanilla and powdered sugar until frosting is smooth and spreadable.
- 4 Spread frosting on top of cooled bars; sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon. Refrigerate 1 hour before serving. To serve, cut into 6 rows by 4 rows
