Paul Tully has been selected by the AOH as the 2018 Grand Marshal because of his consistent and tireless work on behalf of the Irish Cultural Center Hudson Valley (ICCHV). Working with students at Ulster Community College to develop the original concepts for a building; chairing the event when the Irish Ambassador to the United States came here to support the ICCHV; submitting grant applications; planning for and attending countless developmental meetings throughout the years; and regularly supporting the many activities of the AOH and ICCHV are just some of the reasons for which Paul has been chosen.

Paul lives in High Falls with his wife of 48 years, Lauren, who is a member of the LAOH. He is very proud of his three children and six grandchildren, and of his Irish Heritage. Both of his

grandmothers were born in Ireland, coming over here as teenagers, one from Tipperary and one from Waterford. Each married a young man who had been born here, but whose parents were born in Ireland.

In 1889, immediately after arriving in the Port of New York, Paul's paternal grandmother, Mary Lynch, traveled to see her cousin in High Falls. Her cousin was a watchman for the D&H Canal Company and resided near Lock #14. Years later, after marrying and having six children, three of her children would find a home here in Ulster County.

The history on Paul's maternal grandmother's side is similar. His maternal grandmother would marry and have ten children, and have a house in Rosendale. Regarding those many aunts and uncles, Paul related one story about an uncle who was a Jesuit, and served as a Chaplain in WWII for the famous Fighting 69th. Father Steve Meany had been seriously wounded during the battle of Makin Island, in the South Pacific, and, in 1947, was chosen to be the Grand Marshal of the St. Patrick's Day parade in New York City.

In addition to serving on the Building Committee of the ICCHV, Paul also is very active in the community. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Friends of Historic Kingston (FOHK), and regularly conducts walking tours of both the Rondout and the Stockade National Historic Districts on its behalf.

THE HISTORIAN'S CORNER

**BILLY THE KID
SPOKE IRISH!**



The son of Irish immigrants, Henry McCarty was most likely born in New York City in 1859. Glorified and romanticized by Hollywood,

and bestowed by the mystique of the era, much of what we know about this illusive figure is myth and not reality. Henry McCarty, alias William H. Bonney, alias, Billy the Kid is perhaps one of the most interesting individuals to live in the "Wild West" of our imagination. It is widely believed that Billy the Kid was born in the infamous Five Points neighborhood of lower Manhattan, New York City. This slum was home to thousands of poor Irish Immigrants. Until a few years ago, only one photograph existed of this famous outlaw. With Winchester rifle in hand, Colt pistol at his side, circa 1880, this image confirms our imagination of this gun slinger. Recently, a new picture has surfaced. Bought at a flea market for \$10, this new image has been authenticated as the second known picture of "The Kid". In this picture we see a much more "human" image. No guns, now cowboy hat, but a croquet stick in hand, surrounded by friends.

It is widely accepted that Billy the kid was bilingual. It is clear he spoke Spanish. Orphaned at 15, Billy the Kid will eventually make his way from New York City to Lincoln County New Mexico. It is here he would ride off into immortality. Working as a cowboy and a ranch hand, it is believed Billy the Kid spoke fluent Spanish. It should also be noted that although The Kid would become deeply involved in the Lincoln County Wars, a ranch war of frontier justice, he never robbed a bank. Cattle rustling and turf disputes as well as a dramatic jail escape involving the killing of a deputy and sheriff would make The Kid famous for all time. Hunted

and shot down by Sheriff Pat Garret, the story of Billy the Kid would be remade time and time again in film, moves, books, dime novels, and in our imagination. One aspect of his life overlooked until now is that Billy the Kid may have indeed been trilingual! It is now believed he spoke English, Spanish, and Irish.

Living among the poor Irish immigrants of the Five Points, it is absolutely certain he would have heard, and most likely learned how to speak the Irish language. Most historians agree, if he did indeed speak Irish, he would have been illiterate regarding the reading and writing the language of his parents' generation. Billy the Kid historian Chuck Usmar believes he has uncovered evidence that proves the notorious criminal was an Irish speaker. Speaking Spanish and Irish in addition to English would have been a useful skill in the old west. Contact with the mass immigration of the post Civil War era Irish and interactions with natives of an originally Spanish territory would have made these languages invaluable.

It is know that Billy the Kid worked for John Tunstall. Ironically, Tunstall was an Englishman. The Kid helped organized "The Regulators", a group of outlaws to protect the cattle business of Mr. Tunstall. The murder of Tunstall would ignite the Lincoln County wars that made the Kid famous. What is little know is that Billy the Kid also sold cattle for an Irishman named Pat Coughlan. Coughlan, born in Cork in 1822, made his way to New Mexico in 1874. He secured a contract to sell beef at

Fort Stanton, and it is here Bill the Kid worked for this Irishman. Our clue comes from the 1954 testimony of Clark Hust. Hust at the time worked with Billy the Kid for Mr. Coughlan. Hust recalled the visit of Coughlan's niece, Mary. Mary was visiting from Ireland. Historians are certain, based on newspaper evidence, Mary did indeed visit Coughlan in New Mexico on her visit from Ireland. Mary did not speak English, and thus she could only communicate with the Coughlans and Billy the Kid! The cowboy Hust in this interview confirms The Kid acted as a translator between Mary and the ranch hands, including Hust himself.

As the author of "They Fought Bill the Kid", Chuck Usmar is a respected Billy the Kid authority. Whether the testimony of Hust is absolute proof that Billy the Kid was an Irish speaker continues to be up for debate. It does however indicate a strong possibility this was fact. The story of Billy the Kid continues to intrigue Americans to this day. The illusive and uncertain facts surrounding his life only contributes to his legend. Being an Irish speaker only enhances that legend. As this narrative has focused on the Irish language piece of his story, I would encourage our membership to read more. It is truly a fascinating chapter in American history. It can be concluded, that Henry McCarty was indeed shot and killed by Sheriff Pat Garret for his crimes, but, there can be no doubt, Billy the Kid rides on as he lives in the immortality of our imagination. BETTY CROCKER RECIPES



CHOCOLATE CHIP CHRISTMAS COOKIES

Prep 30 MIN
Total 2 HR 0 MIN
Servings 36

Ingredients

1 Pouch (1 lb 1.5 oz) Betty Crocker™ chocolate chip cookie mix
butter and egg called for one cookie mix pouch
1 cup Hershey's™ premier white baking chips
1 cup Hershey's™ semi-sweet or Special Dark™ chocolate chips

TALL, DARK AND STOUT CHOCOLATE LAYER CAKE

Prep 40 MIN
Total 3 HR 30 MIN
Servings 16

INGREDIENTS

Cake

1 box Betty Crocker™ SuperMoist™

devil's food cake mix
1 ¼ cups stout beer
1/3 cup vegetable oil
3 eggs

Chocolate Frosting

12 oz semisweet baking chocolate,
finely chopped
1 ½ cups whipping cream

½ cup butter

Caramel Filling

6 tablespoons caramel topping

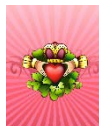
STEPS

1 Heat oven to 350°F (325°F for dark or nonstick pans). Grease bottoms only of three 9- or 8-inch round cake pans. Make cake batter as directed on box, using cake mix, beer, the oil and eggs. Pour about 1 1/2 cups batter into each pan.

2 Bake 18 to 22 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes before removing from pans. Cool completely.

3 Meanwhile, for frosting, place chocolate in medium mixing bowl. In 2-quart saucepan, heat whipping cream and butter to just boiling over medium heat. Pour cream mixture over chocolate; stir with whisk until melted and smooth. Cover and refrigerate 1 hour; stir. Refrigerate about 1 to 1 1/2 hours more or until spreading consistency.

4 Place 1 cake layer on serving plate. Frost top of layer with 1 cup of the frosting. Drizzle with 3 tablespoons caramel topping. Top with another cake layer, 1 cup of the frosting and remaining 3 tablespoons caramel topping. Top with remaining cake layer and frosting. Garnish with chunks of chocolate covered caramels with sea salt, if desired.
